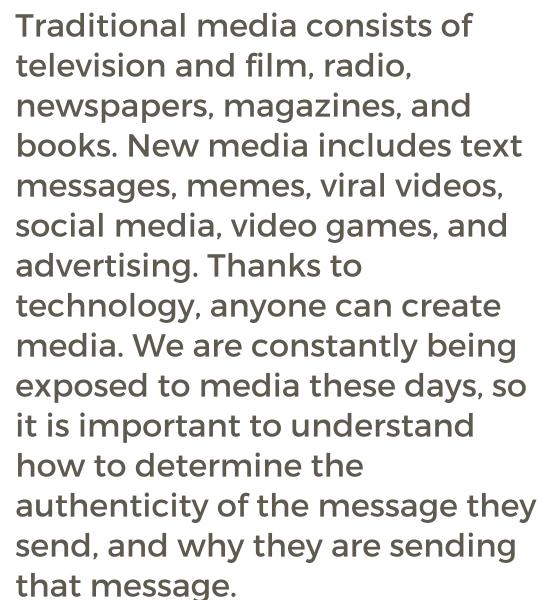
# MEDIA LITERACY AUTHENTICATING INFORMATION

Media literacy is the ability to identify different types of media, and to understand what message they are sending.



## All media is created for a reason.

#### **Ask yourself:**

- Who created this media?
- Why did they make it?
- Who is the message for?
- What about it makes the message believable?
- What has been left out, and why?
- How did the message make you feel?



#### **Misinformation and disinformation**

Misinformation is simply incorrect information, that is often spread by accident (for example, mistaking the start time of a party and telling the incorrect time to a friend); disinformation is incorrect information that is spread on purpose, usually for political or financial gain.

Disinformation is often called "fake news".

### Why do people believe "fake news"?

- There is growing distrust in mainstream media outlets
- It is easy to create and, thanks to the Internet, easy to spread
- It appeals to our emotions about issues
- Our biases

#### **How to check information:**

- Look at the source where did you find the information?
- Read beyond the headline what is written? What is the style like?
- Check the author have they written anything else? What have they written?
- Check for supporting sources does the author back up what they are saying?
- Check the date when was the information first written? What about events it references?
- Check the site what else is published on there?
- Check with an expert use fact-checker websites like Snopes.com to double check
- Understand your own biases how do you feel about issues?
